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Commodore's Corner

Where We Stand **On The Coronavirus**

The HBYC considers the health and safety of our members our top priority. To that end, in March we immediately followed recommendations outlined by the CDC, cancelling Wednesday Night Dinners and all "Club Rentals" until further notice. At that time, I never expected that the Club would still be closed at the beginning of September.

Cases Continue To Grow

However, Coronavirus cases continue to grow in Hernando County. According to Hernando County Public Records, there were a total of 218 total cases from March through June combined, while there were 1,055 in July and 1,328 in August. It is likely that these numbers are not precise, but they clearly represent the trend and, unfortunately, that trend is still increasing.

What We Know

COVID-19 is a new disease. Currently there are limited data and a lot of unknowns, but some things are known:

1. In general, the more people you interact with, the more closely you interact with them and, the

longer that interaction, the higher your risk of getting and spreading COVID-19.

- **2.** In general, your risk of getting severely ill from COVID-19 increases as you get older. In fact, 8 out of 10 COVID-19-related deaths reported in the United States have been among adults aged 65 years and older. Severe illness means that the person with COVID-19 may require hospitalization, intensive care, or a ventilator to help them breathe, or they may even die.
- **3.** There are also other factors that can increase your risk for severe illness, such as having underlying medical conditions. Based on what is known at this time, people with the following conditions might be at an increased risk for severe illness from COVID-19: asthma, high blood pressure, diabetes, serious heart conditions, chronic lung conditions, and more.
- **4.** Due to a lack of treatment options, health officials say prevention is key.

Terry Dunne Succeeds Fred Ganz


HBYC Webmaster Duties Change Hands

About **Fred Ganz**

The original World Wide Web, as it was called, was developed by the European Organization for Nuclear Research (CERN) in Switzerland in 1990. My interest in the Internet began in 1995 and I was fortunate to

work with one of the original members of the CERN design team. This led to a rudimentary understanding of the Internet, including Transmission **Control Proto**col and Inter-



net Protocol (TCP/IP), the two protocols that enable Internet transmission, and also the Universal Resource Locator (URL) the name for the adress of every Internet website.

My company initially provided high speed Internet access to companies in industrial parks on New York's Long Island, with distances up to two miles from our transmission site. Later, this became known as Wi-Fi and at that time we used powerful directional antennas to gain the distance.

In the year 2000, we expanded into video and sound (Multimedia) and installed our Internet services in several major hotels in New York City, including The Plaza, the Park Lane, and the New York City Helmsley hotels. We provided flat-panel display kiosks in every guest room. At the World Trade Center, we developed a new telecomunications design to upgrade their network infrastructure, which was destroyed by the 9/11 attack on the World Trade Center in 2001.

So along the way I had a lot of fun and picked up the basics of website design, which I applied 14 years ago to the new Hernando Beach Yacht Club website.

HBYC Dock Ramp Repaired

A few months ago, one of the ramps to the floating docks had the hinges break and the ramp fell in the water. Dennis O'Keefe raised the

ramp and secured it to prevent further damage.

Upon examination of all the ramps, we found the ramp on the south end, near the marina, needed complete replacement. All the other ramps needed the hinges replaced on the east end of the ramps.

The hinges on the east end of the ramps go underwater during many

of the high tides and caused the failures with the galvanized hinges. Due to the weight of the ramps it was beyond our member's ability could commence repair quickly. The south ramp was unsafe and we agreed to accept their estimate.

The hinges that were used for re-

placement were aluminum and have a much longer life span than galvanize.

We still have plans to replace the handrails in the near future and the job is planned to be completed by HBYC members.
